Greenaction is working with our allies in Oakland and across Utah in opposition to the plan to export up to six million tons of Utah coal each year from a proposed marine export terminal at the former Oakland Army Base.

BVHP & Southeast San Francisco residents have a new tool to get responses to pollution problems. The BVHP Environmental Justice Response Task Force brings together residents, community and environmental justice groups, businesses and local, regional, state and federal agencies to remedy pollution reported by residents.

Part of the growing statewide IVAN network (Identifying Violations Affecting Neighborhoods), a website was created to help residents file pollution complaints online. Dozens of complaints have already come in and are forwarded to the appropriate government agency. The public can track the action or inaction to the complaints online, thus pressuring the agencies to be more responsive and transparent.

US EPA Office of Civil Rights Starts Mediation of Greenaction's Kettleman City Civil Rights Complaint Against California EPA & Department of Toxic Substances Control



The Title VI US Civil Rights Act complaint filed by Greenaction and El Pueblo of Kettleman City against the State Department of Toxic Substances Control and Cal EPA is coming to a climax. The complaint challenges the state's racially discriminatory approval of the expansion of the giant Chemical Waste Management toxic waste landfill in Kettleman City, including the use of blatantly racially discriminatory hearing procedures and police intimidation during the EIR process.

The US EPA's Office of Civil Rights accepted our Title VI Civil Rights Act complaint for investigation shortly after we filed it. Federal mediation is set to begin in mid-November, and the world will quickly learn if the state agencies' alleged commitment to environmental justice and civil rights is real or is it just public relations.
