Bay Conservation and Development Commission staff will present updated maps illustrating the latest projections of sea level rise along San Francisco Bay. We will then have focused smaller group discussions.

As the Sea Level Rise threat, and remediation of contamination sites, is a multijurisdictional issue, we are organizing this meeting in the hope of facilitating a productive and informative discussion and ongoing process where updates and best practices can be shared and increased regulatory agency attention can be focused on this issue.
